THE number of patients the air ambulance treated across Bromley, Bexley, Greenwich and Lewisham has jumped in the last year.

Figures released by the charity reveal the boroughs of Lewisham and Greenwich made it into the top 10 desti-

late transformer to the top to destr-nations across the capital. Last year, the air ambu-lance treated 71 patients in Lewisham, seventh overall, while neighbouring borough Greenwich came ninth, with 69 people treated.

The helicopter was called out to treat 61 people in London's biggest borough, Brom-ley, but Bexley had only 38 patients treated. However, all boroughs have

seen an increase since 2014. Greenwich saw the biggest

rise, 20 per cent, from 55 call-outs, and Bexley was next with a jump of 18 per cent, up from 31 people Bromley had a much lower

increase, 8 per cent, previ-ously treating 56 patients and Lewisham was up seven per cent from 66 casualties.

CEO Graham Hodgkin, CEO of London's air ambulance, said: "While our statistics show we were busier in some areas of the capital than others, trauma can happen to anyone, anywhere, at any time.

"Trauma doesn't have a postcode and neither do we."
